Gulf Freeway closures set

At least one northbound and one southbound main lane and frontage road lane on the Gulf Freeway will be closed from SH 96/Calder/Brittany Bay in League City to FM 519/Main Street in La Marque daily from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. and from 8:30 p.m. to 5 a.m. until further notice.

At least one northbound and one southbound frontage road lane on the Gulf Freeway will be closed from Deats Road in Dickinson to FM 2004/Camp Wallace Access in Texas City from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. until further notice.

At least one northbound and one southbound main lane and frontage road lane on the Gulf Freeway will be closed from FM 519/Main Street in La Marque to Tiki Drive in Galveston daily from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. and nightly from 8:30 p.m. to 5 a.m. until further notice.

The closures are associated with an ongoing construction project to widen the freeway from three to five lanes in each direction and the frontage roads from two to three lanes in each direction.

Spring 2026 STAAR results trickle in

Preliminary results indicate PISD, CCISD on par with statewide gains

The Texas Education Agency has released the Spring 2026 STAAR End-of-Course (EOC) assessment results, providing a statewide snapshot of high school performance in Algebra I, English I, English II, biology and U.S. history.

Published last month, the results, show gains across all tested subjects, with several areas surpassing pre-pandemic performance levels. District-level data for Pasadena ISD and Clear Creek ISD, available through TEA's Research Portal, reflect many of the same upward trends.

This year's STAAR release schedule differed from prior years. Traditionally, TEA publishes all STAAR results – grades 3–8 and high school

EOCs – together in mid-June. In 2026, however, the agency staggered the releases, saying the delay was necessary to implement new science standards and ensure accurate performance benchmarks.

Statewide gains

According to TEA, the percentage of Texas students meeting grade level increased in every EOC subject compared to 2025.

– **Algebra I:** 54 percent of students met grade level, up seven points from 47 percent last year.

– **English I and English II:** Both subjects continued their upward trajectory, surpassing pre-pandemic performance.

– **Biology:** Results exceeded pre-pandemic levels, with steady gains across student groups.

– **U.S. history:** 70 percent of students met grade level, one of the strongest statewide outcomes.

Texas Education Commissioner Mike Morath said the results "reflect the hard work of Texas students, educators and families," adding that "focused instruction and high expectations continue to produce positive outcomes for students across our state."

Pasadena ISD

Pasadena ISD's EOC results, as reported by TEA, show improvement across multiple sub-

jects:

– **English II:** Pasadena ISD students posted year-over-year gains, consistent with statewide literacy improvements.

– **Algebra I:** The district recorded higher percentages of students meeting grade level compared to 2025, mirroring the statewide seven-point increase.

– **Biology:** Pasadena ISD's biology scores improved, aligning with the statewide trend of surpassing pre-pandemic levels.

– **U.S. history:** A majority of Pasadena ISD students met grade level, reflecting the statewide

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Blackhawk power lines raised

Potential traffic signal causes concern

Light at Blackhawk/Riverstone could create safety issues

The possible installation of a new traffic signal on Blackhawk at Riverstone Ranch Drive has renewed concerns from residents, who believe the county's plan – which also calls for the removal of the existing three-way stop at the nearby intersection of Blackhawk and Hall Road – could cause safety concerns.

The proposed installation, which county officials say is to relieve traffic congestion in the area, has been in the works for around a decade. A similar traffic light was installed in 2022 on Hughes Road at Riverstone Ranch.

Should the traffic signal be installed on Blackhawk, county plans call removing the aforementioned stop sign at Hall to further alleviate con-

gestion along the area corridor.

Some community leaders, however, have expressed concern that such a removal of the long-time stop sign could confuse regular commuters on Hall Road who think drivers on Blackhawk still have to stop at the intersection.

At press time, Harris County officials had not officially announced that a decision on the long-studied traffic light had been made, but Precinct 2 staff told the *Leader* that the endeavor was likely moving forward.

The recent raising of nearby power lines on Blackhawk by CenterPoint crews further indicates that installation plans appear to be moving forward.

Thomas promotes Advanced Placement

Parents: The Choices We Make in 5th Grade Can Shape Opportunities in 12th

As parents, we're always trying to make the best choices for our children. We help with homework, sign them up for activities, and look for opportunities that will help them succeed. But what if I told you that some of the choices that can impact your child's future begin years before high school?

In fact, they can begin as early as the transition from fourth grade to fifth grade.

That may sound surprising. When most people think about preparing for college, they picture high school students taking Advanced Placement (AP) classes, earning college credit,

or visiting college campuses. The reality is that many of those opportunities start much earlier.

As students move from fourth grade into fifth grade, families face one of the first academic choices that can influence future opportunities. Pasadena ISD offers Pasadena Advanced Courses (PAC), formerly known as Pre-AP, for students who are ready for an added academic challenge. These courses help students build the skills and confidence needed for AP classes, dual credit opportunities, and college-level work later in their school journey.

Why does this matter?

Because college readiness is not built in one year. It is built over time. The students who earn college credit in high school, become AP Schol-

King: Review of Harris County budget

As Harris County prepares to adopt its budget for the upcoming fiscal year, our team at the Baker Institute conducted a comprehensive review of the County's current budget and budgeting process. You can review our report here. We concluded that Harris County enjoys a relatively strong financial position; however, it is likely to face significant fiscal headwinds in the future.1

- Here are the highlights:
- Harris County is very dependent

on property tax revenues. Property taxes make up over 80% of its general fund revenues.

– Prior to last year's budget cycle, the County Budget Office highlighted that over the last five years, the County's expenditures have been growing faster than its revenues (7% vs. 5%), and that the County will run significant deficits over the next five years unless the County raises more revenues or trims spending.

– From 2020 through 2023, the County's property-tax revenue was relatively flat. However, the County dramatically increased its property-tax rate by approximately 10% in 2024, resulting in record property tax collections. The County Budget Office is assuming the property tax base will increase by 5.5% annually in the future. However, due to state-imposed limitations, political constraints, and other market and demographic factors, we are skeptical that the County's tax base will grow at that rate.

– The County's general fund expenditures are dominated by law enforcement (46%) and the administration of justice, i.e., the court system (17%). Because of recent substantial pay raises for law enforcement officers, those percentages will likely increase in future years. The overcrowding of the Harris County jail due to the backlog of cases in the Harris County courts continues to be a financial challenge for the County. However, there has been some improvement in reducing the backlog in the last year.

– The County is very dependent on excess revenues from the Harris County Toll Road system to fund county road projects. However, as we have previously noted, the County may be approaching the limit on how much it can transfer from the toll road system, which will put additional pressure on its General Fund. <https://www.bakerinstitute.org/research/harris-county-toll-roads-are-generating-large-surpluses>.

– During and immediately after the pandemic, the County relied very heavily on federal grants related to the pandemic. Several new programs were launched, and headcounts in several departments were increased. Most of those grant funds have now been expended, and the County will face difficult decisions about finding alternative funding or scaling back or eliminating those programs.

– From 2018-2023, the County's headcount increased marginally (17,363 to 17,969). However, due in part to federal grant funding, the headcount increased by 11.4% over the last two years (17,969 to 20,020). This increase in the headcount has significantly contributed to expenditures growing faster than revenues.

– Harris County's finances are extremely complex. The County Budget Office must assemble and reconcile information from dozens of departments. We found its staff competent, cooperative, and transparent in its dealings with us. Nevertheless, the County could make significant improvements to its budget documents and website, making its finances more transparent

and accessible to ordinary residents.

– This was our original baseline review of the County's finances. We will be following up on this in the future.

Burns: The illusion of well-intentioned solutions

In our current election cycle, our country was flooded with promises of sweeping "solutions" to our most pressing issues. Recently, these "solutions" often came in the form of Democratic Socialist policies designed to eliminate economic hardship. Whether the proposal was a guaranteed living wage, rent control, or government-funded universal healthcare, these goals were presented as simple matters of compassion and political will.

However, the renowned economist Thomas Sowell offers a cold reality check that every voter and policymaker needs to hear: "There are no solutions, there are only trade-offs."

Sowell's definition of economics centers on an unyielding truth: resources are inherently scarce, while human desires are limitless. In other words, we cannot have everything we want for free. True economic thinking is not about finding a magic bullet; it is about weighing what we must sacrifice to get what we need. When we ignore this, well-intentioned "solutions" trigger severe, unintended consequences.

Consider three popular democratic socialist proposals and the hidden trade-offs they carry:

- Mandated Living Wages: Raising

the local minimum wage to a high "living wage" sounds like an instant fix for poverty. The trade-off, as Sowell frequently points out, is that it raises labor costs. Small businesses must reduce hours, cut benefits, or replace workers with automation. The "solution" ends up pricing workers out of the job market entirely.

– Aggressive Rent Control: Capping what landlords can charge. Housing requires scarce resources to build and maintain. The trade-off of artificially low rent is a collapse in housing quality, landlords' inability to make repairs, and a severe shortage of new construction. The "solution" for today's tenant creates a housing crisis for tomorrow's.

– "Free" Universal Healthcare: Expanding public healthcare for everyone removes the immediate price barrier for patients. However, it does not remove the scarcity of doctors, nurses, hospital beds, and medical equipment. The trade-off of a "free" system is that access must be rationed by time rather than price, resulting in skyrocketing waiting lists, delayed surgeries, and reduced medical innovation.

When we view policies through the lens of trade-offs rather than utopian solutions, our political conversations change. We stop demanding the impossible from our leaders, and we start demanding honesty.

At the next election, let's stop asking if a candidate's policies sound compassionate. Instead, let's ask the essential Sowellian questions: "At what cost? Compared to what? And what are the hard trade-offs we are actually willing to accept?"

ors, or compete at the state level in academic competitions often started building those skills years earlier. They learned how to work through challenges, think critically, and believe in themselves.

As a parent, you might ask, "Why should I consider these opportunities for my child?"

The answer goes far beyond taking harder classes.

When students are involved in advanced academic opportunities, they learn alongside other students who enjoy asking questions, solving problems, and challenging themselves. They begin to see learning as more than simply completing assignments and passing tests. They build confidence, and they think in new ways, and discover talents they may not have known they had. The earlier students get involved, the more time they have to grow those skills.

Just as important is the partnership between families and schools.

Many parents may not know what questions to ask – and that's okay. Most of us are busy working hard, taking care of our families, attending activities, helping with homework, and doing our best to create opportunities for our children. At Pasadena ISD, we want to make the process easier.

We believe parents should not have to figure everything out alone. Our goal is to help families understand the opportunities available to their children, answer questions, provide guidance, and feel supported every step of the way.

For many families, middle school is an important transition. Students move from one teacher to several teachers, expectations increase and new opportunities become available. That is why

partnership matters.

In the South Belt area, schools such as Melillo, Morris, and Roberts Middle School work closely with families during this transition. Parent meetings, campus visits, academic planning sessions, and ongoing communication help families understand what opportunities are available and how to prepare for them.

The goal is not simply to help students adjust to a new school. The goal is to help families understand how decisions made in middle school can open doors in high school and beyond.

What many families may not realize is that Pasadena ISD offers a true K-12 pathway. Students can begin participating in programs such as Spelling Bee, Chess, Gifted and Talented opportunities, UIL A+ Academics, coding experiences, and student leadership activities. As they grow, those opportunities expand into Academic Pentathlon, Academic Decathlon, Pasadena Advanced Courses, Advanced Placement classes, dual credit courses, leadership development opportunities, and college credit programs.

These are not separate programs. They are connected opportunities that help students grow year after year.

And they are producing real results.

Last year, Pasadena ISD students earned more than 7,448 college credit hours, saving local families an estimated \$3.1 million in future college tuition costs. Students are also finding success in Advanced Placement courses. Since 2022, AP enrollment has increased by more than 50 percent, AP exams taken have increased by nearly 40 percent, and the number of AP Scholars has grown by almost 80 per-

cent. Today, Pasadena ISD has 432 AP Scholars.

Learning also happens outside the classroom. More than 900 students participated in district chess competitions across 50 campuses, giving students opportunities to compete, collaborate, and grow. Students are learning to lead as well. A state-record 22 Pasadena ISD campuses have been recognized through student leadership programs, helping students develop communication, teamwork, and leadership skills. Through the Cool 2 Code initiative, students are gaining coding and robotics skills that will serve them well in an increasingly technology-driven world.

Of course, not every student is interested in advanced academics, chess, coding, or academic competitions – and that's okay.

One of the strengths of Pasadena ISD is the variety of opportunities available to students. While some students find their passion through AP classes, dual credit, or academic competitions, others find it on the athletic field, in the band hall, in choir, orchestra, theater, agriculture programs, career and technical education courses, student leadership organizations, fine arts programs, and many other activities.

The list almost feels endless.

That's because every child is different.

Some students find confidence through academics. Others find it through sports. Some discover a love for music. Others discover a passion for healthcare, engineering, agriculture, teaching, public service, or the skilled trades. Our goal is not to put every student on the same path. Our goal is to help every student find their path.

That is what makes the

Pasadena ISD student experience special. Students have the opportunity to explore different interests, discover new talents, and find places where they belong. When students find something that connects to their interests, school becomes more than a place they attend – it becomes a place where they can thrive.

This focus on opportunities is more than a program or initiative. It is a commitment from Superintendent Dr. Toni Lopez and the Pasadena ISD Board of Trustees.

Together, they believe every student deserves access to meaningful opportunities that help them discover their strengths and prepare for the future. Whether that pathway includes advanced academics, college credit, athletics, fine arts, career training, leadership development, or extracurricular involvement, the goal is the same: help every student find a pathway to success.

Perhaps the most important part of the story is access.

Parents should not have to win a lottery or drive across town to find opportunities for their children. Across Pasadena ISD, students have access to advanced academics, leadership programs, academic competitions, robotics, AP courses, dual credit opportunities, fine arts, athletics, career pathways, and specialized learning experiences close to home.

Opportunity should not depend on where you live. Today's families are looking for more than a school. They are looking for a pathway – a pathway that helps students discover their interests, develop their strengths, and prepare for whatever comes next.

And that pathway starts earlier than many people realize.

A student who begins with Chess, Spelling Bee, UIL Academics, student leadership, or advanced coursework in elementary and middle school could later earn college credit, receive scholarships, compete at the state level, or graduate with a clear plan for the future.

As parents consider educational opportunities for their children, it may be worth asking one simple question:

What opportunities will my child have access to over the next thirteen years?

In Pasadena ISD, the answer is more than a single program or a single campus. It is a system designed to help students grow, explore their interests, and prepare for the future.

Because the goal is not simply graduation.

The goal is making sure every student leaves with opportunities they never imagined possible.

PISD Athletics earns statewide honor

Local school district named a Texas Way District of Distinction

Pasadena Independent School District has been honored as a 2025-26 Texas Way District of Distinction, a statewide recognition awarded jointly by the Texas High School Coaches Association (THSCA) and the University Interscholastic League (UIL).

The distinction highlights Pasadena ISD's exceptional commitment to promoting sportsmanship, positive fan behavior, and character-driven athletics across all secondary campuses.

The announcement was made last month during the Texas High School Athletic Directors Association

Convention in Round Rock, where district leaders from across Texas gathered for annual professional development and statewide athletic updates.

Pasadena ISD was selected as one of only 38 districts statewide to receive the honor – an elite group chosen from roughly 1,200 UIL-participating districts.

According to officials, the statewide initiative is focused on character and conduct.

The Texas Way initiative is a collaborative effort developed by UIL, THSCA,

and 2Words Character Development, a widely used character-education program in Texas athletics. The initiative provides districts with tools, training, and expectations designed to elevate conduct at athletic events, strengthen sportsmanship, and reinforce the role of athletics in building responsible young leaders.

Participating districts commit to do the following:

- Encourage respectful fan behavior
- Reduce incidents of unsportsmanlike conduct
- Support coaches in modeling character-based

leadership

- Promote positive interactions among athletes, officials, and spectators
- Integrate character-education lessons into athletic programming

The initiative is now entering its third year of statewide implementation, with growing participation and measurable improvements reported across Texas.

According to Pasadena ISD Athletic Director Patrick Longstreet, the district's second year of participation in the initiative produced clear, measurable gains in sports-

manship and conduct across multiple sports and campuses.

Longstreet reported that Pasadena ISD saw the following improvements:

- Fewer player and coach ejections across the district
- Noticeable improvements in sideline and spectator behavior
- Stronger examples of leadership and character from student-athletes
- Positive feedback from schools implementing Play the Texas Way programming
- Increased community engagement and support for character-driven athletics

SJC, Rice enter into Take Flight Scholars agreement

Partnership promotes STEM education, mentorship

San Jacinto College and Rice University entered into an agreement for the Take Flight Scholars Program, an initiative that aims to expand access to high-impact academic, research and transfer-readiness opportunities for honors students.

"Through the Take Flight Scholars Program, more students will have expanded access to transformative academic experiences to continue their education at one of the nation's leading universities. The Take Flight Scholars Program is open to honors students studying in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math), business, arts and humanities, and social sciences. The program goals include creating and supporting learning opportunities for students to develop and deepen interest in their chosen academic area of study. It is also designed to empower students to complete their associate degree and then transfer.

Students who participate in the program will have the opportunity to attend events and connect with current Rice University students; participate in enriching summer research and project-based experiences, including paid summer research opportunities; receive mentorship from faculty, graduate students and current Rice students; and will be prepared to transfer. Students who transfer from San Jacinto College to Rice University are guaranteed to receive Rice course equivalent credit for a set of core courses.

Currently, there are 72 San Jacinto College honors students participating in the Take Flight program. One student stated, "As someone who did not grow up around people who attended four-year universities, a program like the Take Flight Scholars partnership represents not only an opportunity, but a bridge connecting where I come from to the future I am determined to build."

Storm sewer work currently underway on Dixie Farm



Much to the disappointment of several area residents, work currently being done along FM 1959/Dixie Farm Road between Beamer and the Gulf Freeway involves the storm sewer system and not road repairs. The stretch of road has long been complained about by local residents because

70 percent benchmark.

– **English I:** The district showed steady improvement, consistent with TEA's statewide upward trajectory.

– **Clear Creek ISD**

Clear Creek ISD posted results that exceeded statewide averages in several areas:

– **Algebra I:** Clear Creek ISD students outperformed the state average, continuing the district's strong math record.

– **English I and II:** Both subjects showed high proficiency rates, reflecting statewide gains in literacy.

– **Biology:** Clear Creek ISD's Biology results surpassed pre-pandemic levels, consistent with TEA's statewide findings.

– **U.S. history:** Clear Creek ISD posted one of its

strongest subject performances, aligning with the statewide 70 percent meeting grade level.

Remember When

50 years ago (1976)

After a meeting between Harris County and city of Pearland officials, the road connecting Green Tee Terrace and Sagemeadow was reopened. The meeting included two owners of a portion of the property where the road is located.

An estimated increase of nearly \$1 million for utilities was included in the proposed 1976-77 Pasadena Independent School District budget.

45 years ago (1981)

Longtime Dobie High School track and field coach John Bryan resigned to take a similar position at La Porte High School.

The road linking the back of San Jacinto College South to Seardsdale’s Astoria Boulevard was completed, giving direct access to the Gulf Freeway.

40 years ago (1986)

Frazier Elementary principal John Markgraf resigned and moved to Chicago.

County Judge Jon Lindsay met with the Southeast Harris County Economic Development Council after a request for economic development funds. Between \$50,000 and \$75,000 would be made available for monitored use by the council.

City and county law enforcement were working to solve a series of burglaries in the South Belt. The suspects were believed to use police scanners to avoid being caught.

Due to nonfunded state-mandated programs and slow economic conditions, PISD feared a \$5 million budget deficit.

A vacant house on Sageville Drive, which had become an eyesore after a

fire approximately two years earlier, was bulldozed and the lot cleared.

35 years ago (1991)

George Rodonaia, a Soviet dissident, was happy to find a position at Cokesbury United Methodist Church as associate pastor.

Two South Belt homeowners arrived home in the 11000 block of Sagerock to find Hispanic males armed with double-barreled shot-

guns waiting in the garage. According to Precinct 2 Sgt. Rick Holloman, the invaders demanded entry to the house, but one of the homeowners refused. One of the armed men fired a blast into a brick wall. Neighbors were alerted, but when they arrived, the two men took their car keys then stole two vehicles and fled.

30 years ago (1996)

Jon Paul Fleming, 17, was

working as a mess hall supervisor at El Rancho Cima Boy Scout Camp near San Marcos when he noticed a Scout leader choking. Fleming performed the Heimlich maneuver on the man, who was from a Genoa troop. The Scout leader, previously unknown to Fleming, said he would have died had Fleming not performed the life-saving maneuver.

Gregory Jones, assistant

principal at South Houston High School for seven years, was named principal at Thompson Intermediate.

25 years ago (2001)

FEMA required residents in the 100-year flood plain whose homes were damaged 50 percent of the appraised value (less land value) to either raise the structure or abandon it. The city announced plans to open a local office for homeowners

seeking permits to repair their homes.

Members of Sagemont Church and of The Freedom Church, formerly known as Gulf Meadows Baptist Church, announced the joining of their respective memberships into one collective church family.

20 years ago (2006)

U.S. District Judge Sam Sparks ruled that Rep. Tom DeLay had withdrawn his

candidacy for the general election for Congressional District 22 as opposed to becoming ineligible. As a result, DeLay’s name would stay on the November general election ballot.

Precinct 2 deputy constables responded to numerous calls for service after the 4th of July holiday. The calls included assault, burglaries to a home and a business as well as an arrest for possession of cocaine.

15 years ago (2011)

Construction of the new right-turn lane on Blackhawk south of Beltway 8 heading east to the Gulf Freeway began Monday, July 11, after multiple setbacks.

10 years ago (2016)

A recent Dobie graduate was fatally shot Saturday, July 9, while riding as a vehicle passenger in the 12300 block of the Gulf Freeway near Fuqua. Geovanni “Geo” Rios, 18, was pronounced dead at the scene. According to police, Rios was a backseat passenger in a white Chevrolet Tahoe traveling north on the freeway frontage road around 1:35 a.m. when the vehicle was struck by multiple gunshots, presumably fired from another vehicle, investigators said. Rios was struck in the head by a bullet, killing him. No immediate arrests were made.

South Belt resident and longtime owner of USA Karate, Michael Stewart Tucker, died July 8 after battling an illness.

5 years ago (2021)

Chris Bui was recently selected by Pasadena ISD officials to serve as the new principal of Atkinson Elementary. Prior to his new post, Bui served as assistant

principal at Melillo Middle School from 2008-2021, seventh-eighth-grade science teacher and instructional facilitator at Scobee Junior High in Southwest ISD in San Antonio from 2004-2008; fifth-grade science teacher/special education coordinator at KIPP Aspire Academy in San Antonio from 2003-2004; and seventh-grade science teacher at Pin Oak Middle School in Houston ISD from 2002-2003. Bui attended Trinity University in San Antonio from 1994 to 1998, earning a Bachelor of Science in biology with minors in chemistry and Spanish. Originally planning to become a physician, Bui enrolled in medical school at the University of Texas Health Science Center. Near the end of his third year of medical school, however, Bui chose to leave medical school and pursue the education field. Bui returned to Trinity University from 2001-2002, earning a Master of Arts in teaching. Bui went on to study at St. Mary’s University in San Antonio from 2005-2007, earning a principal certification.

1 year ago (2025)

Local businessman and longtime San Jacinto College board member John Moon Jr. died unexpectedly Friday, July 4, from a suspected heart attack. A product of Pasadena ISD, Moon attended San Jacinto College after graduating from Sam Rayburn High School. He went on to receive a Bachelor of Business Administration from Southern Methodist University and a Master of Science from the University of Houston-Clear Lake. Moon would later serve as an adjunct professor at San Jacinto College before being elected to the school’s Board of Trustees Position 5 seat in 2009. At the time of his death, Moon served as vice chair of the board. He served as chair of the college’s Building Committee and formerly served on the school’s Finance Committee. Moon additionally served on the San Jacinto College Foundation’s board of directors. A certified public accountant and licensed real estate agent, Moon spent 30 years in the banking industry before shifting toward commercial real estate and investments later in his career.

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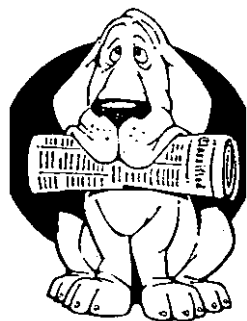

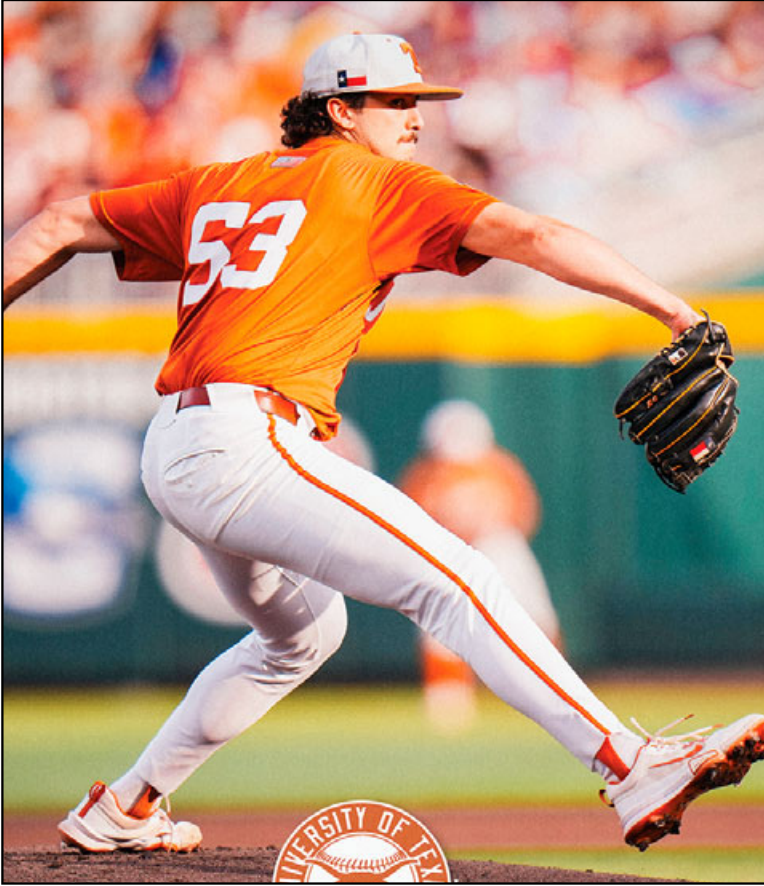
