Gulf Freeway closures set
At least one northbound and one southbound main lane and frontage road lane on the Gulf Freeway will be closed from SH 96/Calder/Brittany Bay in League City to FM 519/Main Street in La Marque daily from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. and from 8:30 p.m. to 5 a.m. until further notice.
At least one northbound and one southbound frontage road lane on the Gulf Freeway will be closed from Deats Road in Dickinson to FM 2004/Camp Wallace Access in Texas City from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. until further notice.

At least one northbound and one southbound main lane and frontage road lane on the Gulf Freeway will be closed from FM 519/Main Street in La Marque to Tiki Drive in Galveston daily from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. and nightly from 8:30 p.m. to 5 a.m. until further notice.

Local civic clubs to hold group meeting Sept. 2

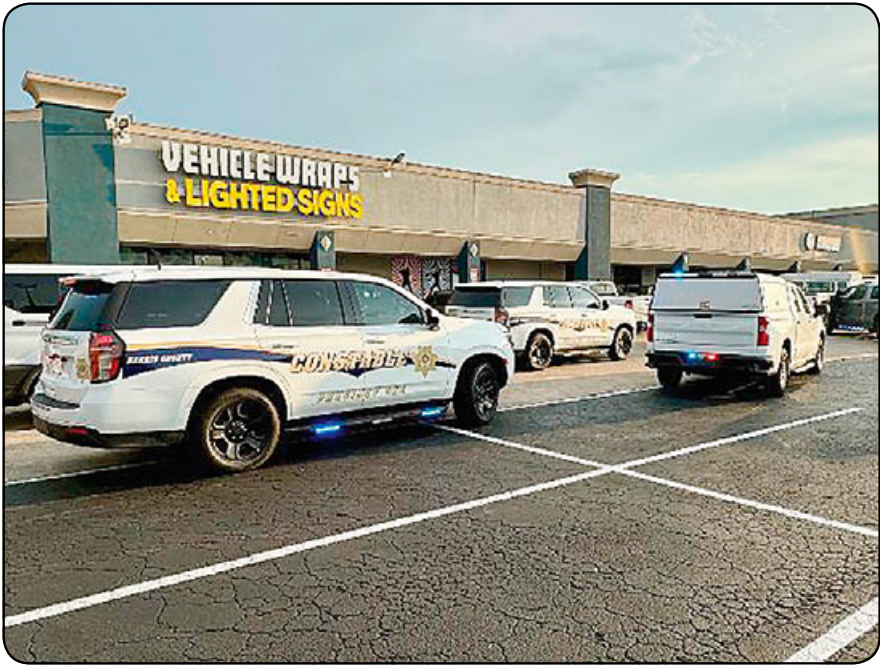
Event to feature multiple notable guests representing city, county government

Local civic club leaders are planning a special group meeting open to all neighborhood HOAs/organizations in the South Belt community, set to take place Tuesday, Sept. 2, at The Gardens located at 12001 Beamer at Hughes.

Illegal game room raided

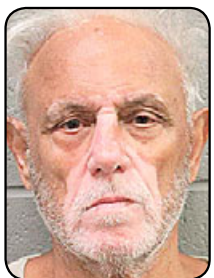

Vernagallo to appear in court Sept. 12

Former Pct. 2 deputy charged with murdering neighbor in 2023

A former Precinct 2 deputy accused of fatally shooting his neighbor in 2023 over a long-running dispute is scheduled to appear in court Friday, Sept. 12.
Frankie Luke Vernagallo, now 81, was charged with murder in the 482nd State District Court in June 2023 after allegedly killing Jaime Hernandez, who resided in the house next to him in the 10500 block of Kirkglenn Drive.
According to homicide investigators, Vernagallo had a years-long dispute with the victim, whom he claimed ran a crime ring out of his parents' home next door.
Vernagallo frequently wrote the *Leader* and local police agencies, including the Houston Police Department and the Precinct 2 constable's office, reporting suspected criminal activity at his neighbor's house. Alleged crimes ranged from drug sales to storing stolen goods and even armed robbery.
Prior to the 2023 shooting, the former deputy wrote 139 emails to the *Leader* since Nov. 11, 2011, including one letter just two hours before the shooting, describing a suspected drug deal. The email said he had also alerted both HPD and Precinct 2 about the alleged incident.
Precinct 2 officials described Vernagallo as a "chronic caller" and suggested he suffered from

mental health issues.
The lengthy letters, written in all caps, were often rambling and incoherent. They were also delivered to dozens of others, including Harris County Sheriff Ed Gonzalez, HPD Chief Troy Finner, the FBI and Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick.
The *Leader* had reached out to law enforcement about the escalating situation in the months leading up to the murder and was told that both HPD and Precinct 2 had reached out to the suspect about mental health support to no avail. Otherwise, their hands were tied legally, unless a specific crime was committed, officials said.
On the morning of the homicide, patrol officers responded to a shooting at the above address and found an unresponsive male with an apparent gunshot wound lying on the ground. Houston Fire Department paramedics transported the male to an area hospital where he was pronounced dead.
Witnesses reported seeing Vernagallo return to his house next door following the shooting. Responding officers were able to get Vernagallo out of his residence without further incident and found a weapon in his possession.
The Harris County District Attorney's Office was consulted and Vernagallo was subsequently charged for his role in the shooting. His bond was set at \$200,000.
Precinct 2 officials said Vernagallo left the department in 1998 amid an investigation into him. Records of the investigation, however, have been destroyed, as they are more than 20 years old, officials said.

Houston to have citywide test of emergency alert system

Test to be conducted Sept. 5 by city's Office of Emergency Management

The city of Houston Office of Emergency Management (OEM) will conduct a citywide test of the Wireless Emergency Alert (WEA) system Friday, Sept. 5, at 11 a.m.
This test is part of the Integrated Public Alert and Warning System (IPAWS), a nationwide capability designed to deliver critical public safety alerts. At the scheduled time, individuals in the Houston area with WEA-capable mobile devices will receive the following message:
"TEST Wireless Emergency Alert from the City of Houston Office of Emergency Management: No Action Required. TEST ALERT. For more information visit HoustonOEM.org/respond/"
An alert will also go out in Spanish, for those who have their phone settings set to Spanish. The alert in Spanish will say:
"PRUEBA de Alerta Inalámbrica de Emergencia de la Oficina de Manejo de Emergencias de Houston: No se requiere acción. ALERTA DE PRUEBA. Para más información, visite HoustonOEM.org/respond/"
Some residents with older mobile devices may receive a shorter version of this message.
Who will receive the test?: Anyone located within the city of Houston jurisdiction with a WEA-capable mobile device on September 5 between 11 a.m. and 11:15 a.m. will receive the test. Each person will only receive one alert – either in English or in Spanish – based on their phone's language setting. No one should receive more than one alert. While the WEA test is intended only for people in the city of Houston, the system is based on cell tower coverage, not exact jurisdiction lines. This means some neighboring areas may also receive the alert.
Why test?: Testing public alert systems is essential to ensure they work properly in the event of a real emergency. Timely and accurate alerts can save lives during severe weather, chemical incidents, active threats, or other urgent hazards. The WEA system allows Houston OEM to send geographically targeted alerts to mobile devices in situations where immediate life-saving action is required. These alerts are rare and are only used during the most critical emergencies.
Understanding Houston's Emergency Alert Strategy
Houston uses a tiered approach to public alerting that includes the following elements:
– WEA Alerts (Wireless Emergency

Alerts): These are issued through the federal IPAWS system and go to all compatible cell phones in a defined area. They are only used for life-threatening emergencies that require immediate lifesaving action.
– AlertHouston: For less urgent but still important situations – like flash flood watches, roadway impacts, or severe weather awareness – OEM uses the AlertHouston system. This is a free, opt-in service where residents can receive texts, emails, or voice messages. To sign up, visit HoustonOEM.org or text "AlertHouston" to 888777.
– Everyday Preparedness: On clear "blue sky" days, OEM shares helpful tips and preparedness information through social media, community events, and education campaigns.
Check emergency alert settings
The OEM strongly urges residents to enable

their emergency alerts in case of an imminent threat. These alerts could save one's life. To receive Wireless Emergency Alerts, one's phone must have alerts enabled in their device settings.
– iPhone: Go to Settings > Notifications, scroll to the bottom under Government Alerts, and ensure Emergency Alerts are turned ON.
– Android: Go to Settings > Safety & Emergency > Wireless Emergency Alerts, and make sure Allow Alerts are enabled.
Note: Houston OEM does not send AMBER Alerts. The OEM only uses the WEA system for critical emergency alerts impacting public safety. The OEM strongly urges residents to enable their emergency alerts in case of an imminent threat.

Deputies involved in multiple pursuits

6 suspects arrested by Pct. 2 deputies, including 4 juveniles

Deputies with Harris County Precinct 2 Constable Jerry Garcia's office have been in multiple pursuits recently, one resulting in the arrest of four juvenile suspects.
Six suspects were taken into custody for evading in just a two-day period, according to Precinct 2 officials.
Juvenile arrests
On Sunday, Aug. 24, at approximately 1:30 a.m., Precinct 2 deputies received an alert from the department's FLOCK license plate-reading cameras that a stolen car was traveling on Alameda Genoa near Monroe. Deputies located the vehicle in the area and attempted to conduct a traffic stop, prompting the driver to flee.
A chase ensued, in which the driver led deputies on a 30-mile pursuit. The chase came to an end when the driver crashed the vehicle in the Pearland area off SH 288.
A 17-year-old male was taken into custody

and charged with unauthorized use of a motor vehicle and felony evading, and two juvenile males were taken into custody for evading on foot. Two more juveniles stayed in the vehicles, reportedly intoxicated, and were also detained.
The driver was charged as an adult, but Precinct 2 officials did not release his name/photo. The passengers were charged as juveniles.
High-speed chase
The following day on Monday, Aug. 25, Precinct 2 deputies with the Toll Road Division observed a vehicle traveling at 109 mph in a 65 mph zone. A traffic stop was attempted but the driver chose to flee, leading deputies on a high-speed pursuit.
The driver eventually pulled over and surrendered without further incident.
Adrian A. Rios was arrested and charged with felony evading in a motor vehicle. Rios was subsequently booked into the Harris County Jail.
"Let this be a reminder – reckless driving puts everyone at risk, and fleeing from law enforcement only makes things worse," said Precinct 2 Capt. Marcus Anderson. "We're committed to keeping our roads safe."

Former library demolished

Police launch DWI crackdown

Local patrols ramped up during Labor Day holiday

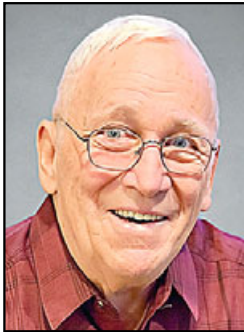
Texas law enforcement agencies, in partnership with the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), are intensifying patrols for the Labor Day holiday weekend to combat impaired driving. The statewide enforcement initiative, currently underway through Sept. 1, is part of the annual Drive Sober. No Regrets. campaign to prevent alcohol-related crashes and fatalities. **Heightened patrols and 'no-refusal' enforcement** Across the state, officers from the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS), county sheriff's offices and local police departments will increase their presence on Texas roadways. - **Increased patrols:** Law enforcement will be on heightened alert for drivers suspected of operating a vehicle while intoxicated. - **Targeted stops:** Agencies will conduct targeted traffic stops as part of the na-

tionwide enforcement push. - **No-refusal weekends:** Several jurisdictions, including Harris County, will enforce "no-refusal" rules, in which magistrates are on call to issue search warrants for blood samples from drivers who refuse a sobriety test. **Consequences of a DWI conviction** Authorities are reminding the public that a DWI conviction carries serious and long-lasting consequences. These can include the following: - Jail time. - Loss of a driver's license. - Fines and fees up to \$17,000 for a single offense. - Long-term personal and financial costs. **Preventable crashes and tragic outcomes** The enforcement effort is a direct response to a continued trend of preventable DWI crashes. - **2024 Labor Day statistics:** During the Labor Day weekend in 2024, Texas recorded 327 alcohol-related

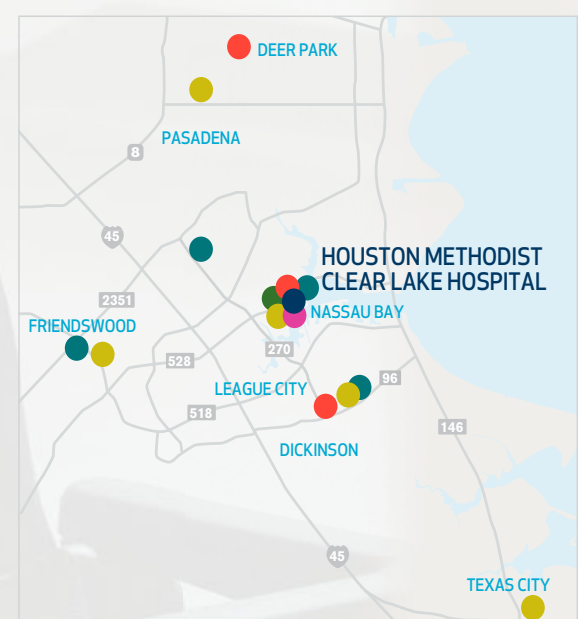
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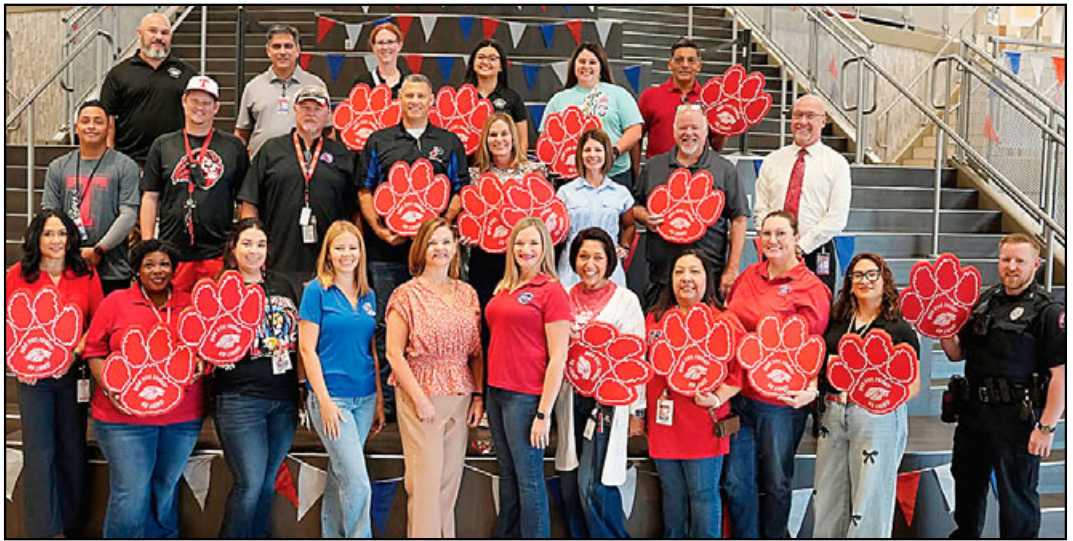

Remember When

45 years ago (1980)
Pasadena Independent School District enrollment figures showed that once again the South Belt area – which accounted for one-fourth of the district's 35,415 enrollment – had the district's largest high school, intermediate school and elementary school: Dobie High, Thompson Intermediate and Burnett Elementary.

Numerous South Belt business establishments had used their marquees to send out get well wishes to Houston Astro pitcher J.R. Richard since his surgery the previous month. The Harris County Sheriff's Department investigated the attempted rape of a 19-year-old Kirkmont resident. The woman, who was cleaning the Kirkmont house of a friend who was out of town, reported a young man forced his way into the house and threatened her with a knife.

Trustees of the Clear Creek Independent School District adopted a \$36,073,999 budget and retained the 1980 tax rate of 82 cents per \$100 valuation at their regular monthly meeting.

40 years ago (1985)
U.S. Postal Service officials acknowledged that traffic flow

problems existed within the potential service area of a planned post office for the South Belt area and said that the Postal Service would support South Belt Coalition efforts to get the problems resolved.

Houston vice officers raided a Scarsdale apartment complex after an anonymous tip that pornographic-related activities were taking place in one of the units.

Work on a new section of the beltway that would ultimately stretch past Interstate 45 and Beamer Road was expected to begin during the month according to representatives of the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The City of Houston planned to begin construction the following year of a regional, 50 million gallons-a-day water treatment plant on the north side of Ellington, east of Highway 3.

35 Years ago (1990)
Approximately 1,400 feet of noise reduction barriers would be included in the extension of Beltway 8 through the South Belt area.

First-day enrollment for PSD schools increased by 2,070 students from 33,817 to 35,887. Both elementary and secondary school enrollments rose by approximately 1,000 students.

Planning was underway for Investment Land and Development Co. to build 43 new homes on 9.7 acres of land at Hughes Road and Blackhawk.

30 years ago (1995)
A free gold card good for free admission to all Pasadena school district athletic events, plays, musicals and concerts is available to district residents age 60 and older. Applications may be obtained at the *South Belt-Ellington Leader* office. In addition, gold cardholders are offered nutritionally balanced, low-cost (\$1.60) lunches at district schools. On the senior citizen's first visit to a school for lunch, the campus principal will tell the seniors about the lunch schedule and escort them to the cafeteria.

25 years ago (2000)
Pasadena Independent School District involved faculty and staff in planning for the new Dobie.

Gene Paul Robertson, 28, was arrested and charged with a felony murder in the death of Anthony (Tony) Chapin, 23.

Andrew René Love, 19, was found dead in his home. Fomer Dobie principal Frank Braden suffered a heart attack and was recovering in Bayshore Hospital.

The Sagemeadow home of Glenda Chaney was destroyed by a fire. The Southeast Volunteer Fire Department and Houston Fire stations 70 (on Beamer) and 93 (on FM 1959) fought the fire.

20 years ago (2005)
Local elected officials expressed optimism for the military presence at Ellington Field to continue despite being affected by the Base Realignment and Closure committee. The Texas Air National Guard was slated to lose its F-16s, which would result in the loss of about half of the personnel of the 147th Fighter Intercept Group.

PISD trustees approved a \$355.7 million budget for the 2005-2006 school year.

Gas prices in Houston soared. Regular unleaded at South Belt area stations ranged from \$2.74 to \$3.31 per gallon. This was after Hurricane Katrina hit the Gulf Coast but before Rita threatened the Houston area.

15 years ago (2010)
The accomplice in the 2009 kidnapping of Susana De Jesus was sentenced to 13 years in prison for his role in the crime that left the former South Belt resident dead. Wallace Ledet IV pleaded guilty to aggravated kidnapping in the case, as well as burglary of a habitation in an unrelated crime. Ledet, 26, was reportedly a high school friend of Nicholas-Michael Edwin Jean, who in May, pleaded guilty to killing De Jesus, and in June, was sentenced to life in prison with no chance of parole. Ledet told investigators he had nothing to do with De Jesus' death but admitted dropping Jean off at the site of the abduction.

10 years ago (2015)
Houston District E City Council Member Dave Martin honored outgoing Pasadena Independent School District Superintendent Kirk Lewis by presenting him with a special proclamation during a public Council session.

A 20-year-old man was hospitalized in serious but stable condition after he was shot three times at an apartment complex in the 10900 block of the Gulf Freeway near Hartsook. No immediate arrests were made.

5 years ago (2020)
The South Belt community was spared the brunt of Hurricane Laura Thursday, Aug. 27, as the storm took a turn east toward Louisiana. The Category 4 storm made landfall near Cameron, La., just after midnight, bringing 150-mile-an-hour winds and a major storm surge. The hurricane was one of the strongest on record in the state.

On Aug. 31, Harris County Precinct 2 deputies responded to a call in the 11500 block of Sagerperry, where a drive-by shooting had taken place. According to deputies, multiple rounds had been fired into the residence, but no injuries were reported. No immediate arrests were made.

Two people were shot Friday, Aug. 28, in a road incident on Fuqua near the Gulf Freeway – one of whom was an 8-year-old boy.

According to police, the incident began when a family was pulling out of the Taco Bell in the 11100 block of Fuqua and almost struck another vehicle that was reportedly driving with its lights off. After the two cars almost collided, the drivers had a verbal altercation, before speeding to the east on Fuqua. As the family approached North Featherwood Drive, the driver of the second vehicle opened fire, striking two of the passengers.

A woman sitting in the passenger seat was shot in the shoulder, while the child was shot in the shoulder and thumb. The two were transported to the hospital and were expected to be OK.

1 year ago (2024)
Two homes in the Woodmeadows subdivision caught fire within minutes of each other the morning of Monday, Aug. 26, after being struck by lightning. According to Southeast Volunteer Fire Department officials, a house on Poplarwood Court suffered extensive attic damage, while a second residence located on Pigeonwood suffered minor roof and wall damage. Firefighters responded to a third lightning call at the same time at a business on Scarsdale but no physical damage was observed. SVFD was assisted by the Pearland Fire Department.
